Library Junction

Library Junction was built in 1918 to establish rail service to Montour Mine #10, then being opened in Library. In 1929, the branch was extended to Snowden in South Park to provide an interchange with the B&O Railroad.

The junction was constructed as a wye track which gave the railroad the flexibility to send trains to and from either direction to service mines and interchange points to the east and west, or along the Library Branch.

The triangular wye arrangement was also used to turn entire trains around to put its locomotive at the front end



After shoving its cars all the way from Bethel Park, engine 75 backs down the east leg of the wye. It will run along each leg of the wye, recouple to its train and then proceed west with the engine leading the train. The storage siding track can be seen to the left of the train.

A siding track ran along the east leg of the wye nearly to Church Hill Road. It could temporarily store up to 40

of a train for better operation.

cars coming to or from the mine in Library or the Snowden interchange. Operations on the Library Branch were ended in 1978 and service on the main line at the end of 1980.

In 1985, Peters Township purchased the abandoned railroad right-of-way for use as a recreational trail.



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
